Pittsford rolls to 12th title

Lindsay Stone and Katie Smith are best friends. They do every-thing together. Swim. Travel. Go to church.

They even brea state records together.

Smith and Stone each won two individual events and teamed with senior Stephanie Andrews and freshman Emma Corby to break the state mark in the 200yard freestyle relay as Pittsford captured its 12th consecutive Section V Class A title at Webster Aquatic Center on Friday.
"As Katie was coming

to the wall I didn't think that state record would soon be ours. It was crazy when we looked up to the board," said Stone, who was named the Swimmer of the Meet. "It's rewarding to see the hard work and rigorous training pay off when a team comes together to put up awe-some times."

The group set the sec-tional standard in preliminaries but finished in 1:35.58 in the finals, besting the time set by Clar-ence (Section VI) last

year.
The Panthers cruised victory with 524

Smith and Stone have formed a formidable tandem. Smith dom-inates the sprints and Stone the distance races.

"We probably do see each other more than our parents," Smith said. "We're with each other all day, every day. It's great to have someone to grow with mentally, physically and spiritually."

"When I was in first grade we moved a couple of houses down from (Smith)," Stone said. families friends. (Smith) and I would walk over and have sleepovers all of the time. We're inseparable. We're practically

the same person."

Well, almost. Pittsford coach Marty Keating, who has won 21 sectional championships in his 40 years leading the girls team, said their tal-ent levels are comparable but their paths are distinct.

"Smith is sort of an enigma. She's the quieter one. A year and a half ago she was an average ago she was an average swimmer. We put her on a program and she just blossomed," Keating said. "Stone is just cold-blooded. She'd ram a

Stone, a freshman, handily won the 200 freestyle in 1:52.42. She defended her title in the 500 freestyle and was followed by a cavalcade of teammates as the Pan-



thers placed 1-3-4-5.

Smith, who held off Megan Burns of Rush-Henrietta for the second straight year in the 50 and 100 freestyles, set a Class A meet record in the 100 (52.32). The sophomore anchored the winning 200

and 400 freestyle relays. Stone, Smith, Andrews and Becca Evans set a new Section V record of 3:30.34 in the 400 freestyle relay to close out the meet

Natalie Zaravella made a splash in the Vic-tor's first year in Class A. She broke the 10-year old meet record in 200 individual medley, finishing in 2:07.8. The Blue Devils took second place.

A youth movement emerged with a freshman or sophomore winning eight of the nine individ-ual events. That bodes

well for the future of Section V, which took the top sectional spot last year at

states.

Keating isn't slowing

down either.

"I'm getting ready to go to another clinic next month," he said with an exuberant smile. "My mother always said to me, 'You find something you love and you'll never work a day in your life.' I love this."
